1. Several die in a suicide attack in Nigeria

In the past few months, Nigeria has witnessed a new wave of bombings by Islamic Movement of Nigeria (IMN), a local Shia Muslim group, and the radical Sunni group - Boko Haram. The followers of IMN were bombed again by Boko Haram near Kano, during their march to mark the 40th day of Ashura, resulting in at least 21 being killed and many more wounded.

1. Religious Freedom Roundtable considers initiatives to advance rights and freedoms
